November 20, 4-6 p.m. - Hymn Festival with World Premier

You are all invited to a special music event that will be held at Our Savior Lutheran Church (7910 E. St. Joe Hwy., Lansing) on November 20, 4–6 p.m., which will feature acclaimed church musician Dr. John Behnke and a premier of a piece that he composed in honor of my parents, June and Bohdan Horak. The featured piece is based on the familiar hymn, "I'm But a Stranger Here."



My parents are both now with their Lord and Savior in heaven. On their tomb stone is a scripture verse, Revelation 2:10, which was used at both of their funerals. What is a little unusual are the two hymns inscribed underneath their birth and death dates. For my dad, his favorite hymn "Nearer My God to Thee" became the plural *Nearer Our God to Thee* and my mom's favorite hymn "I'm But a Stranger Here" has the line "Heaven is my home" which is now *Heaven Is Our Home*. Why plural? Because their faith was so much a part of their marriage and of our family.

To honor my parents, I commissioned Dr. John Behnke of Milwaukee, WI, to compose a piece based on the hymn "I'm But a Stranger Here," which will be premiered at the Our Savior Hymn Festival, a special musical celebration of hymns, anthems, and songs. This composition, by Dr. Behnke, is a hymn arrangement or concertato for congregation, choir, organ, handbells, brass, timpani and cymbals. The following appears underneath the title of the composition: Commissioned by John Horak in memory of his loving Christian parents: June and Bohdan Horak. "Heaven is now their home."

Leading our hymn festival with Dr. Behnke will be musicians from Our Savior, including a festival adult choir, adult hand bell choir, and grades 4-8 choirs from Our Savior Lutheran School, and several church choirs from our surrounding community. Most important to a hymn festival is the role of the congregation in the singing of these wonderful hymns from the church's history: Reformation, All Saints Day, Christ the King, Thanksgiving and Advent. You won't want to miss the opportunity to make a joyful noise with a 60+ choir, brass, timpani, and of course, the organ. I hope you can join us! End the year with thanks and praise!

Conference - Honoring Skinner Organ at Jefferson Ave. Presbyterian Church

On Palm Sunday, March 26, 1926, Skinner Opus 475 was first heard at a worship service at Jefferson Ave. Presbyterian Church (8625 E. Jefferson Ave., Detroit). It was dedicated on April 8 with a performance by University of Michigan Professor, Palmer Christian. Due to the pragmatic care of the church and the watchful eye of Ken and Dorothy Holden, the organ has survived several major artistic changes in the organ world to emerge as one of the outstanding extant examples of Ernest Skinner.

The conference on October 1, 9:30 a.m.–9:30 p.m., will include lectures on the history and physical design of the instrument, an interview with Ken and Dorothy Holden on their restoration in the 1970s and the subsequent research leading to Dorothy's authorship of the Skinner Biography, a lecture on the Skinner Roll-Player pipe organs, a talk on the legacy of Skinner's successor, Carl Bassett, multiple organ demonstrations, Carillon picnic lunch, sit-down dinner, and an evening concert at 7:30 p.m. by world-renowned concert organist, Todd Wilson.



Recitalists include Christian Bischof, St. Margaret's Church, Munich, Germany; Scott Dettra, Church of the Incarnation, Dallas, TX; Prof. Joseph Gascho, University of Michigan; Prof. Tiffany Ng, University of Michigan; Prof. Kola Owolabi, University of Michigan; Dr. Kimberly Schafer, Carillonneur, Chicago, IL.

Topics for lectures and workshops include current practices in Christian churches; Gregorian and Anglican chant; a reading session with tips for African-American gospel, spirituals, and anthems; depictions of the carillon; and recent Bach discoveries for recitals, church, and teaching.

Registration is \$100 for general public and \$50 for students (non-U of M).
